

SPECIAL FEATURE: BOB BYRD!

Alamance County voters are cheering the announcement that Bob Byrd is going to run to regain his seat on the Board of County Commissioners in 2020!

Bob was elected to the County Commission in 2014 and he was the only Democrat on the Commission for four years.

Bob says: "I am proud of my hard work on the Board, especially my steadfast support for public education and the locally unprecedented positions I took on such issues as the Confederate monument, immigration, public transportation and the proposed MVP pipeline." In 2018 he came extremely close to getting re-elected: He was only 303 votes short in the General Election in which more than 53,000 people voted!

Since that election, Bob's Facebook page shows that he has been to more than 200 events.

That is truly staying in touch with the people!

Bob is not your average local politician. A "late bloomer" in political activities, Bob uniquely brings a rich background of personal interests, leadership, community service, a distinguished local management career, and much energy to the forefront of holding an elected office.

For more than 35 years Bob held a senior executive position at Alamance Regional Medical Center. When he retired from the Medical Center, Bob was representing ARMC on the community-wide Vision Plan Committee of the Alamance Burlington School System, which had been organized by the Alamance Chamber of Commerce. "It was then that I realized that our schools needed more help from our County Commissioners, and that as a Commissioner I could make a difference," Bob continues.

Bob's goals: "I want Alamance County to be the place where young people will want to settle, have successful careers, and raise their families. Progress was made during my four years on the board, but there is still much work to do, especially around education and good, sustainable jobs."



Bob has energy and endurance not normally seen by "late bloomer" politicians. A good example of this is the fact that he and Barbara are avid road Cyclists.

In addition to participating in area rides and charity cycling events, they have proudly ridden across the state 15 times as part of "Cycle North Carolina's Mountains to the Coast Ride." Each of these 15 rides was a 7-day trek held during the first week of October. Following a different route each year, the 2019 ride took them 478 miles from Blowing Rock to Atlantic Beach. "Being physically fit and healthy is important to us," Bob says.

As a semi-professional saxophonist, Bobs leads an active musical life. He co-founded, directs, and plays lead sax in the 18-piece Alamance Jazz Band, now finishing its 32rd year providing big band music to the Alamance County area.

Organized under the auspices of the Alamance County Arts Council, the band rehearses weekly and performs several times every year.



Bob has had the privilege of performing as a single-engagement sideman throughout North Carolina with many regionally known big bands, jazz combos and orchestras. With the US Airways Jazz Orchestra, he performed in Germany, Holland, Bermuda, and throughout the United States.

Barbara Byrd is the organist and Choir Director at Graham Presbyterian Church. Bob and Barbara perform frequently together as a sax-piano duo at church services, recitals, weddings, funerals, banquets, and receptions.

Bob continues his engagement in the community by serving in positions and on boards including Cardinal Innovations Healthcare, Alamance Eldercare, Burlington-Alamance Sister Cities, Allied Churches of Alamance County, Alamance Racial Equity Alliance, NAACP, Women's Resource Center, Burlington Velo Club, and the Piedmont Triad Chapter of the Penn State Alumni Association.

Tia was a cheerleader in her freshman year and decided to join the ladies' tennis team in her sophomore year. She is on the tennis team again this year.









ONE DEMOCRAT CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE: CUTLER RENARD – DAVIDSON!


Recently the State Board of Elections formally declared that the Davidson College CatCard, the basic student ID, would be acceptable ID for voting in the 2020 election.


