

LAWRENCE CARTER – WAKE COUNTY!

Lawrence Carter is a dedicated and enthusiastic Raleigh man who has served on the NCDP's State Executive Committee for more than six years.

When Governor Cooper first ran for Governor, Lawrence convinced him to come and speak at his church, Popular Springs Christian Church in Garner.

Lawrence was born in Lexington and lived in Cabarrus County until he was six. At that time he enrolled in the Governor Morehead School in Raleigh where he was educated through high school. While there he met his wife, Margaret, and they both have produced lives that have been beneficial to many people.

Following high school Lawrence attended NC A&T State University.

Margaret teaches Special Education to Kindergarten through fifth grade.

They enjoy baby sitting for two children three days a week. They are the parents of a daughter named Christie who is a Registered Nurse. Currently she works for a travel nurse company at a medical facility in Hoover, Alabama.

Lawrence had partial sight in one eye until he was age 42 when his "body made a lot of changes" which resulted in complete loss of sight.





Many famous people have enjoyed visiting with Lawrence during many different campaigns – including Senator Kay Hagan and Clay Aiken.

Lawrence has served as Chair of the Mayor's Committee for Persons with Disabilities in Raleigh for about 12 years.

He has also been singing in the Male Chorus at Popular Springs Christian Church for almost 40 years.

When asked about Lawrence's political style, State Representative Rosa Gill said: "He is deliberate in making sure he has all the facts before making decisions. He is patient with others and he is a strong Democrat."

SHAUNA WILLIAMS TO RECEIVE BIDEN PRESIDENTIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD!

Shauna Williams of Warren County will receive the prestigious 2023 Joseph R. Biden Presidential Lifetime Achievement Award during a ceremony at North Carolina Central University on September 30th. She will also receive a Presidential lapel pin, a gold medallion, and a congratulatory letter from President Biden.

This Democrat gives a tremendous amount of help to her husband, Warren County Democratic Party Chair Yarbrough Williams.

Shauna Williams – formerly Shauna Singletary – began her career with WTVD-11 in Durham in 1976, where she was the third African-American on air in television news. Afterward, she worked for 25 years at NBC Network News as an on-air reporter, producer and writer, starting at the Miami Bureau. She later worked on the Today Show, NBC Nightly News, Dateline, and with the New York Bureau, including on air for MSNBC.

Her assignments included three major plane crashes, Princess Diana's funeral in London, natural disasters, and covering the President of the United States which allowed her to travel in presidential motorcades and to ride on Air Force One.



In 2000 this award-winning broadcast journalist married Yarbrough Williams of Warren County. She continued working for NBC as a freelance producer for 13 years after moving back to North Carolina.

Shauna has spent much of her life helping others. In her youth, growing up in a suburb of New York City, she first put her heart for service to work collecting donations door-to-door for children with cerebral palsy. Since then she has lent her time and talents to both Girl and Boy Scouts, sports programs, aspiring journalists, and countless other people everywhere she has lived.

In both United Methodist and Baptist churches, Williams has held many positions including Sunday School teacher, superintendent, trustee, usher,

choir member, youth leaders, and certified lay speaker.

In Warren County Williams is President of the board of Trustees for the Warren County Community Center, Treasurer of the Warren County Political Action Council, assistant to the County Chair of the Warren County Democratic Party and a Precinct Chair.

Shauna received an Edward R. Murrow Award for spot news coverage, has been recognized for outstanding community service and is a VIP member of many Who's Who honor rolls.

She says that she is grateful for her parents and other relatives who were role modes in home, church, work, life, and in the community.

She earned a bachelor's degree in education from Duke University where she was on the Dean's List and in Who's Who, and earned a Master's Degree in Journalism from Columbia University.

Shauna and Yarbrough have five children, 11 grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. In addition to being a Nana, she loves to travel, cook, and read. She is currently writing several books and will soon add "author" to her list of accomplishments.

A requirement to receive this presidential award is to have contributed more than 4,000 hours of lifetime service.

Growing up in Louisiana, Henderson County Party Chair Michelle Antalec remembers canvassing and working the New Orleans voting polls with her grandmother. "Being active in politics has always been my passion," she said. "It feels comfortable and it's so good to be directly involved again."

Michelle knew she would study political science in college. She did an undergraduate degree at Millsaps College and served as a Senate intern during her junior year. During her studies, she discovered she also liked business and went on to get a master's degree in finance from Louisiana State University. She spent her career in risk management moving to Flat Rock when she married her husband, Michael Bell, in 2014.

"Over the years, I had stayed somewhat active in political activities, doing phone banking for Obama and other things," she said. "When I moved to Flat Rock, I was asked to be Precinct Chair, and that's how I became involved with the Henderson County Democratic Party. I was Precinct Chair three times and served as First Vice Chair under Cindy Ellis. Earlier this year I was able to stop working full time and I had also built up a knowledge of North Carolina after living here for nine years, so I finally had enough time and resources to consider being County Chair. She was elected at the County Convention in April.







Despite restrictive voting laws passed by the state's Republican-controlled General Assembly earlier this year, Michelle has an upbeat attitude and sees many factors working in favor of Democrats in Henderson County.

"Demographics are changing as more people move into Henderson County from out of state and also from Asheville, We have a great community of Democrats and progressive unaffiliates, and when we vote, we win. We're also working on a plan to help people get voter IDs and to help provide paper copies of IDs for absentee voters."

Beyond HCDP Michell and her husband enjoy spending time with their six four-legged children: Miles Davis, Dizzy Doodle, Thai, Teddy, Ryan and Lyla. During the past year they hosted a Japanese exchange student, and Michelle is honorary Auntie and mentor to a Georgia Tech graduate student from Cameroon. In the past she has been involved in theatre and still enjoys supporting theatre productions.

"I feel that my main strength is that I can get along with almost anyone and connect with people, so this is a good role for me. I'm a negotiator and I know how to take feedback. I'm excited!"


